The Ford Rouge Factory Tour offers awe-inspiring encounters with America's celebrated manufacturing past, present, and future. From walking through an actual truck plant to viewing the "living roof," you'll enjoy some eye-opening encounters with technology of today while learning about the world-changing past. Get an inside look at the making of Ford's F-150 truck, and rev up your inner engineer as you experience a real factory floor in operation.

Lunch will be at The Henry, an upscale hotel named in honor of United States veteran Henry Dearborn. Enjoy mixed field green salad, grilled chicken, mashed potatoes, broccolini, and cheesecake for dessert.

After lunch, a step-on guide will take us on a driving tour of Dearborn. Henry Ford lived most of his life here, leaving behind a legacy that has touched nearly every part of the city. The final stop will be the Russell Stover Candy Outlet filled with sweet temptations.

To the Moon and Back

"One small step for man, one giant leap for mankind!" Neil Armstrong's historic first steps on the moon won the space race for the United States, an achievement that can be traced back to a traditional childhood. Discover the roots of this private man on a tour of his hometown of Wapakoneta, a community with tremendous pride in its famous native son.

Our celebration of the 50th anniversary of the first moon landing includes a tour of the Armstrong Air & Space Museum. Designed to resemble a futuristic moon base, the museum contains a range of artifacts from Armstrong's space suits to an entire Gemini VIII capsule to an actual moon rock. Learn from docents, interactive exhibits, three simulators, and the Astro Theater, a unique venue showing a 25-minute documentary about Apollo 11's lunar landing.

Enjoy a hot buffet lunch of fried chicken and meatloaf, twice baked mashed potatoes, Italian green beans, bread, and key lime mousse cups at Moon City Music and Event Center. After lunch the award winning band New Outlook will entertain us and there will be an opportunity to visit the gift shop.

Tour the magnificent Turner-Dodge House and learn about Lansing's early pioneers at the museum within. Built in 1855, the three story Georgian Revival house has an impressive two-story front porch with Ionic columns, large classical doorways, multiple fireplaces, and beveled and leaded glass windows.

Thursday, October 10. Bus departs from Lourdes University parking lot M at 9:00 am and returns about 7:00 pm. Price is \$109 for members, \$129 for nonmembers. This trip is sold out.

National Veterans Memorial & Museum

America has a long, proud history of military service and volunteerism during wartime. Heroes such as General George Washington and Senator John H. Glenn are well documented on the national stage. But there are others – nearly countless in number – whose military experiences are known only to family, friends and descendants. The National Veterans Memorial and Museum is the only place where the stories of our veterans, their families and the Fallen will be told together.

Opened in October, 2018, the National Veterans Memorial and Museum celebrates and honors the sacrifice of all of our veterans, past and present, from our Greatest Generation to our recent heroes coming home from Afghanistan and Iraq. Inside the museum, exhibitions focus on the people – the soldier, sailor, airman, Marine, Coastguardsman and their families – from answering the call to life after military service. Individual stories and shared experiences are illustrated through personal artifacts, quotes, letters, imagery and powerful films of veterans telling their unique story in their own words. Docents will guide our group through the first floor exhibition gallery and there will be time to explore the upper levels at your own pace. The National Veterans Memorial and Museum connects historical events to current concerns and strengthens understanding and respect between civilians and veterans.

Before visiting the museum, we will start the day with a visit to the Great Southern Hotel, a Victorian landmark hotel listed on the National Register of Historic Places. After major renovation and restoration, the hotel has earned its place among Ohio's finest historic hotels. The lobby is a sophisticated gem; the original marble front desk is still a focal point, with two amazing griffin-like figures that flank both ends. Opening the doors to the historic hotel's ballroom reveals a stunning space illuminated by five great stained glass windows near the ceiling, depicting symbols of hospitality and fine dining.

After touring the Great Southern Hotel, explore Columbus during a driving tour with a step-on guide. Highlights of downtown Columbus include the Ohio Statehouse, the old department stores and restaurants, the vibrant Short North neighborhood, Goodale Park and more. Enjoy a gourmet lunch at the Great Southern of chicken marsala over herbed pappardelle pasta with wild mushrooms, roasted garlic, fresh herbs, sautéed broccolini, and oven roasted tomato marsala reduction. Dessert will be a chocolate torte with raspberry chambord sauce.

Thursday, November 14. Bus departs from Lourdes University parking lot M at 7:30 am and returns about 7:00 pm. Price is \$128 for members, \$148 for nonmembers, and \$116 for veterans. Register by October 11.

Paris to Pittsburgh: the Climate for Change is now.

Wednesday, June 12

From coastal cities to America's heartland, *Paris to Pittsburgh* is a film that celebrates how Americans are demanding and developing real solutions in the face of climate change. Presented by National Geographic, it brings to life the impassioned efforts of individuals who are battling the most severe threats of climate change in their own backyards. Set against the national debate over the United States' energy future, the film captures what's at stake for communities around our country.

Paris to Pittsburgh is produced by the Academy Award and Emmy-winning production company RadicalMedia, in partnership with Bloomberg Philanthropies and is narrated by Emmy and Golden Globe Award-winning actress and activist Rachel Brosnahan.

After viewing the film, Dr. Andy Jorgensen will lead the discussion. Dr. Jorgensen is an Associate Professor Emeritus of Chemistry, University of Toledo & Senior Fellow, National Council for Science and the Environment. Dr. Jorgensen has studied the science of climate change and how best to present the facts about the problem to a wide range of audiences.

Experience a thrilling NASA rocket launch and orbit the Earth to get an astronaut's view of a sunrise in space. *Field Trip to the Moon* is a virtual journey created using NASA engineering models and scientific data. Like real astronauts, you will come face-to-face with the challenges and excitement of traveling through space to land on the Moon. Along the way, you'll visit other moons in our solar system, and learn about recent missions to the Moon. After the show in the Appold Planetarium, continue the conversation over lunch at the Lourdes Café (cost of lunch not included).

Leonard Bernstein: A Centennial Appreciation

3:00 – 4:30 pm, Mondays, June 10 – 24

2018 marked the centenary of the birth of the brilliant composer, conductor, and educator

Leonard Bernstein. This course will consider Bernstein's achievements as a composer for Broadway (*Candide*, *West Side Story*), film (*On the Waterfront*), and the concert hall (3 symphonies, *Mass*); his status as one of the most impactful conductors of the twentieth century (including his advocacy for American music and the works of Mahler and Shostakovich); and as an educator, especially through his Young People's Concerts (1958-1972) and his Harvard Norton lecture series, "The Unanswered Question" (1973).

Dr. Christopher Williams holds a PhD in Music History and Literature from the University of California at Berkeley, and has taught at the University of Toledo, Bowling Green State University, the Universität Salzburg, and in the joint program of the Cleveland Institute of Music and Case Western Reserve University. He is considered an expert on the music of *Fin-de-siècle* Vienna.

Civil War “Stuff” and Memory

In 1867, the U.S. counted 1.8 million veterans from both sides of the Civil War, about 5% of the population. The experiences of these men, and others who lived through the war, was built upon “stuff” they came in contact with during and after the war. This class examines some of the things from the Civil War – battlefields, weapons, cemeteries, and monuments – folks utilized to make sense of the conflict or reframe their memories of the war. This class examines how memory of the Civil War, through the creation of “stuff”, is still a persistent conversation piece in contemporary U.S. society.

Dr. Steve Bare is an adjunct faculty member in the University of Toledo's History Department. Dr. Bare's research and teaching specializations focus on how Americans craft historical memory of conflicts from the Civil War through WWII.

Let your creativity flow! All you need is a creative spark and we will help with the rest. Once you choose a favorite image we will patiently show you how to turn it into a work of art that you will be proud to share with your family and friends. The process –similar to that used to print currency— is an extension of drawing, but don't let concerns about your drawing ability limit you! The maximum size of the monochrome intaglio prints will be 8x10 inches. Warning: come prepared to get dirty!

Puccini and the End of Popular Opera

Dr. Christopher Williams

3:00 – 4:30 pm, Mondays, July 8 – 22

The operas of Giacomo Puccini (1858-1924) stand among the most beloved of all works for the lyric stage, with *La Bohème* (1896), *Tosca* (1900) and *Madama Butterfly* (1904) regularly listed among the ten most frequently performed operas. It is also clear that no subsequent opera composer has been able to capture the popular imagination to the same degree, from advertising to soccer tournaments and the Olympics, to television talent shows, and even supplying the

plots of hit musicals like *Rent* and *Miss Saigon*. This course considers what made Puccini's music so effective and enduring, as well as why he was the last composer of truly popular opera. Scenes and extended passages from all his major operas will be discussed in terms of their melodic structures, harmonic language, use of the orchestra, dramatic fluidity and “realism,” stylistic diversity, and the composer's underrated engagement with musical modernism.

Fact, Fiction, and Adaptation: King Lear

10:00 – 11:15 am, Tuesday, July 9

King Lear is one of Shakespeare's most famous plays; the main plot of an aging monarch who steps away from his throne with tragic results has resonated as a story about relationships between parents and children and a tale about grappling with aging for centuries. Yet Shakespeare significantly modified the historical sources he used, and even more interestingly, for almost 200 years after Shakespeare, a radically edited version of the play—one with a happier ending—was the only one seen on stage. In this class, we will discuss the narrative transformations of *Lear* and learn about the interaction between drama and culture in Renaissance and Restoration era England and talk about the continuing value of this story today.

It is recommended that you read *King Lear* before class and bring a copy with you. The instructor recommends Simon & Schuster's version (ISBN: 9781501118111).

Dr. Susan Shelangoskie is a Professor of English at Lourdes University. She teaches courses in British and world literature, and specializes in Victorian literature, technology, and culture. Her scholarly work has appeared in journals such as the *Journal of Victorian Culture* and *Nineteenth-Century Contexts*.

Toledo's "Perfect Storm" Continues

Are the Algal Blooms of Late Spring and Summer a New Normal for Lake Erie Water?

As memories of Toledo's 2014 water crisis fade, this presentation reviews the circumstances that came together as a "perfect storm" of algal bloom which overwhelmed our water purification system. What changes have been made in

Toledo's water purification process? Are these really effective if nothing else changes? Have phosphorus levels decreased? Have agricultural practices changed? Or do we accept that algal blooms will continue to plague Lake Erie into the future?

The work of regional activist-organizations will be described in raising awareness, creating effective public policy, and initiating community dialog as we work together for a common cause—the safety of our drinking water.

Marya Czech is a retired professor from the Lourdes University Biology Department and currently works as a regional environmentalist.


